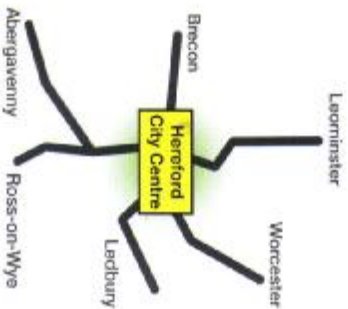
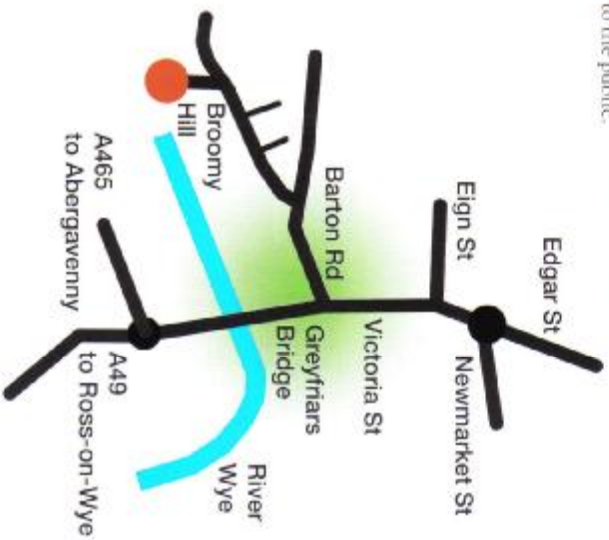


DIRECTIONS

From the centre of Hereford take the A49 Ross road, turning right into Barton Road and after 400 metres turn left into Broomy Hill. Proceed for 600 metres and turn left as signposted for the Waterworks Museum. The site is on the right hand side just after the Museum.

The Waterworks Museum is signed by the brown tourist information signs from many parts of the city, and is also open to the public.

HOME OF THE HERFORD SOCIETY OF MODEL ENGINEERS

The Society was formed in 1962 and has many members, some of whom live well away from Hereford.

The site has facilities to cover track gauges from "00" to 7 1/4". There is a ground level track and an independent raised level track, used by both steam, electric and petrol powered locomotives, all capable of passenger carrying.



The club house is a modern building with kitchen and is in use for meetings and many other interesting functions. There is also a well equipped workshop nearby. Although the railway interests predominate there are many other interests that our members are involved in, and all aspects of model engineering can be catered for. We also welcome visiting locomotives on our steaming days by prior arrangement, and with the support of boiler and insurance certificates.

STEAMING DAYS AT BROOMY HILL

The dates for this year will be found on the insert sheet. Normally, they are the second and last Sundays in the month from Easter to October, starting at noon and finishing at 4.30. There is ample FREE parking on the site and plenty of room to walk about and view the locomotives in action. Why not bring a picnic and make an afternoon of it! There are two separate tracks. One is the elevated track that accommodates the smaller locomotives. The other, longer track, sees the larger engines and runs from Broomy Hill Station. This system is signalled and has a working signal box on the end of the platforms. You can see the locomotives take on water and coal just like their full size brothers. Then off they go round the track, over the bridge, through the tunnel, past Howards Halt and back to Broomy Hill.

One word of caution, the steam locos are hot and they can be smutty, so please keep clear and obey instructions of station and train staff.

Most of all enjoy yourselves!



Whilst the steaming days are open to the general public, the site has great potential for other events involving the use of the railway.

Private parties can be arranged to suit your requirements (contact details on insert). The site is great for birthday parties. A train and other facilities can be available to make someone's, and their friends, special day.
